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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 SECURITY CLASSIFICATION

This document is marked as **UNCLASSIFIED** as there are no sensitive details contained in it and it is expressly written to be circulated both internally and externally.

1.2 DATA INTEGRITY¹

The statistics, tables and graphs contained in this document are based on substantiated cases, which are active investigations of an incident that has definitely happened. This is as opposed to using incident data, which is an initial recording of a crime that has yet to be substantiated.

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1.3 EXPLANATION OF GRAPHS

The graphs used in this report include standard deviation, which has been used as a means of objectively measuring how much the crime rate has varied over time and is useful in identifying extreme highs and lows of crime. Standard deviation has been used so that where the crime rate is above the red line (2 standard deviation above the mean average), it is considered exceptionally high. Where the crime rate is below the blue line (2 standard deviation below the mean average), it is considered exceptionally low. In both cases it can be referred to as statistically significant (high or low) and is an indication of whether the quarterly statistics are exceptionally high or exceptionally low.

1.4 AIM

The aim of this report is to produce accurate, timely, objective information that:

- Enables informed decisions to be made on the types of crime that threaten the safety of the community.
- Is used to proactively manage risks to the island and ensure effective policing, redeploying and directing resources at a strategic and tactical level, as required.
- Facilitates effective and open communication with our stakeholders, developing the means to inform them of the plans, efforts and progress being made by the BPS.
- Provides meaningful information as one of the means of reassuring communities in Bermuda.

1.5 Executive Summary

There were **899** offences in **Q1 2014**, an **increase** of **+87** or **10.7%** when compared to Q4 2013. Q1 2014 presents the seventh quarter in a row whereby offences have remained under 1,000 per quarter and is the fifth lowest quarter since 2000. Incidents – Calls for Service and Arrests in Q1 2014 have **decreased**. There were **0** murders and **1** injury by firearm in Q1 2014.

Crimes Against The Person and Crimes Against Property have **increased** when Q1 2014 is compared to Q1 2013, whereas Crimes Against the Community **decreased**. However the overall 5 year trend shows a **decrease** in all categories. A summary of the 3 key crime headings and 20 crime categories for Q1 2014 in comparison to the previous quarter (Q4 2013), the same quarter last year (Q1 2013) and the 5 year trend is shown below in figure 1:

2. ALL CRIME

2.1 SUMMARY

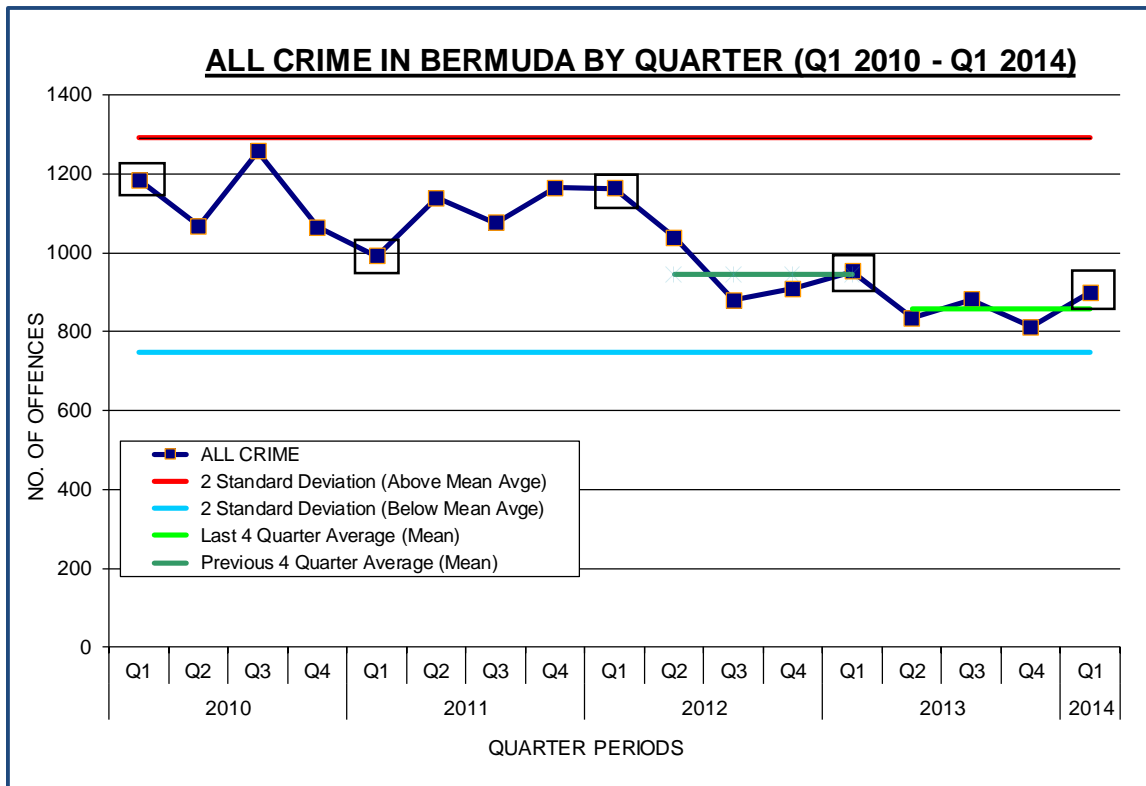
Figure 2: All Crime (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

The total for All Crime in Q1 2014 **increased** by **+87** offences or **+10.7%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-53** offences or by **-5.6%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **899** as can be seen in Figure 2:

2.2 TRENDS

Q1 2014 presents the seventh quarter in a row whereby offences have remained under 1,000 per quarter and is the fifth lowest quarter since 2000. In 2010 and 2011 all quarters (with the exception of Q1 2011) were above 1,000 offences. This can be seen in Figure 3, which shows crime for the last 17 quarters, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

3. CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

3.1 SUMMARY

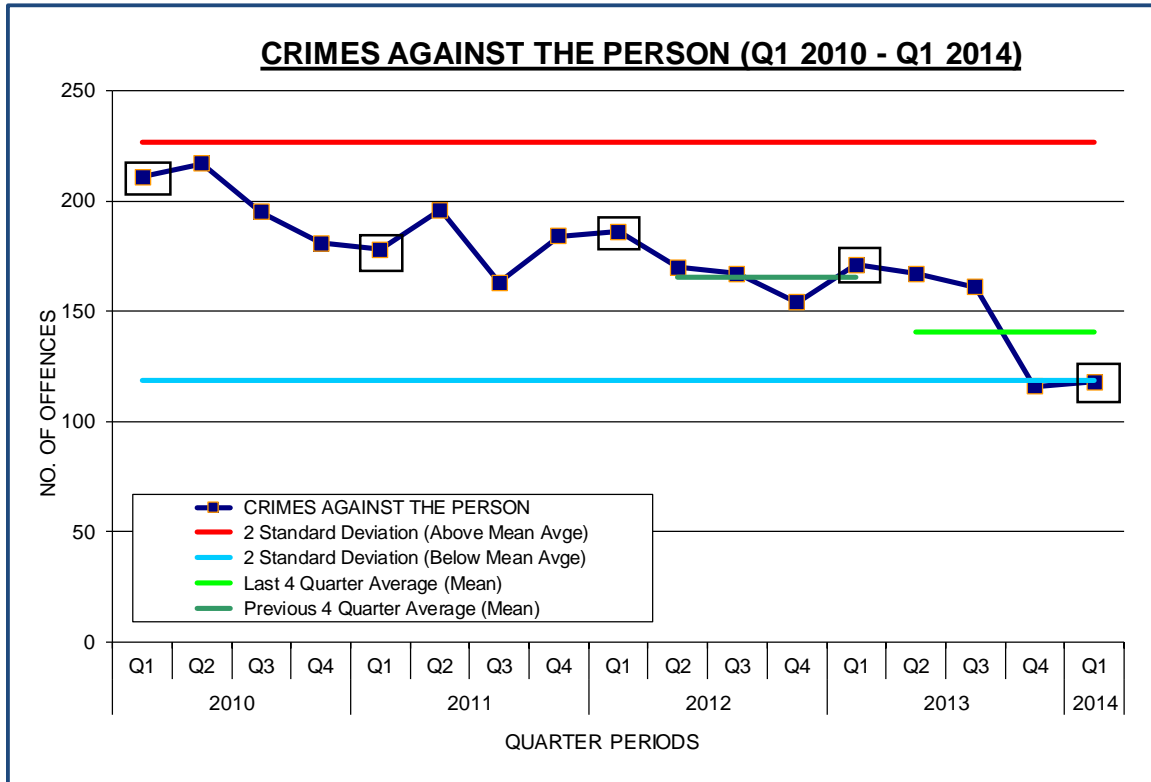
Figure 4: Crimes Against the Person (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Crimes Against The Person offences in Q1 2014 **increased** by **+2** offences or **+1.7%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-53** offences or by **-31.0%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **118** as can be seen in Figure 4:

3.2. TRENDS

In Q1 2014 the long term trend of Crimes Against The Person continues to **decrease** with Q1 2014 being the 15th consecutive quarter under 200 offences. When compared to Q4 2013, the most notable crime of Q1 2014 within the Crimes Against The Person category was Other Assaults with **92** offences (**+5**). Robbery has **decreased** (**-3**) and Serious Assaults have also **decreased** (**-3**), however Indecency has **increased** (**+2**). A summary of Crimes Against The Person for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 5, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

Figure 5: Crimes Against the Person By Quarters (Q1 2010 – Q1 2014)



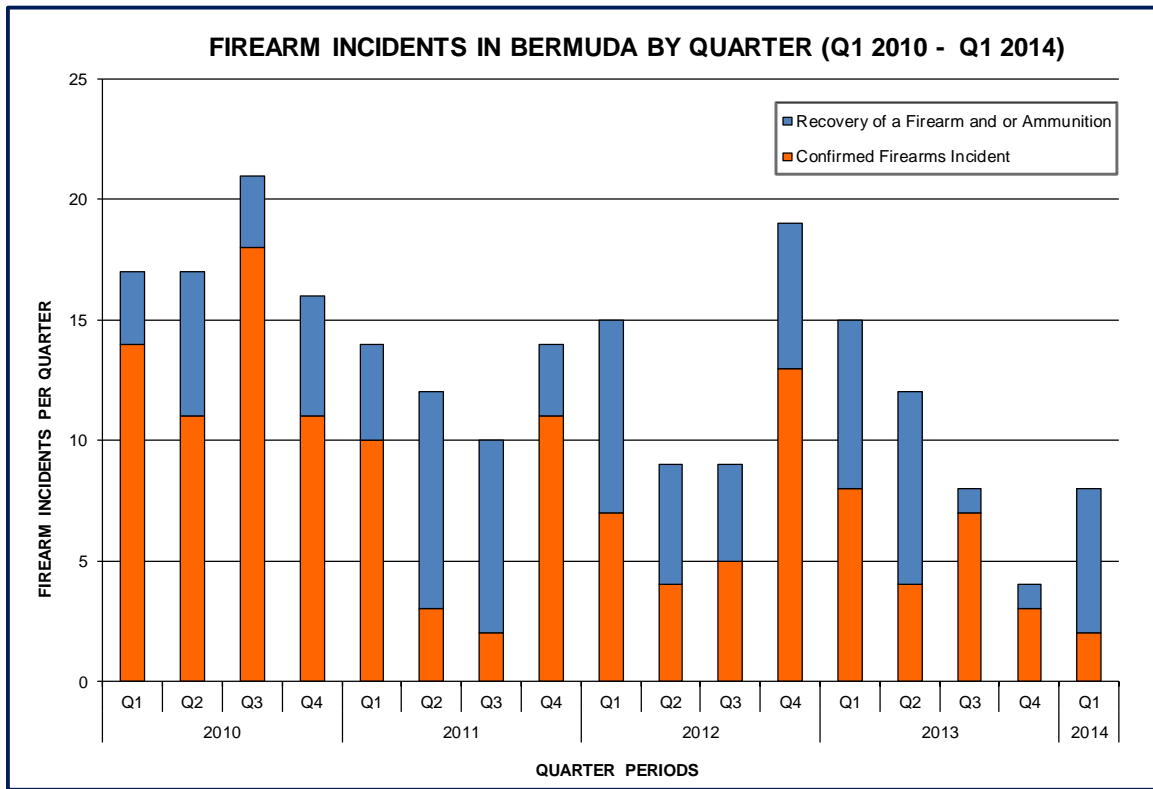
4. FIREARM INCIDENTS

Firearm Offences are included within Crimes Against The Community (Section 5); however Firearm Incidents² may not necessarily be recorded as offences, as often there is no suspect or even a victim.

4.1 SUMMARY

In Q1 2014 there were **8** Firearm Incidents of which **2** were Confirmed Firearm Incidents and **6** were the Recovery of a Firearm and or Ammunition. This is an **increase** in the number recorded in Q4 2013 whereby there were **4 (+4)** Firearms Incidents of which **3 (-1)** were Confirmed Firearm Incidents and **1 (+5)** was the Recovery of a Firearm and/or Ammunition. A summary of Firearms Incidents for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 6:

Figure 6: Firearm Incidents In Bermuda (Q1 2010 – Q1 2014)

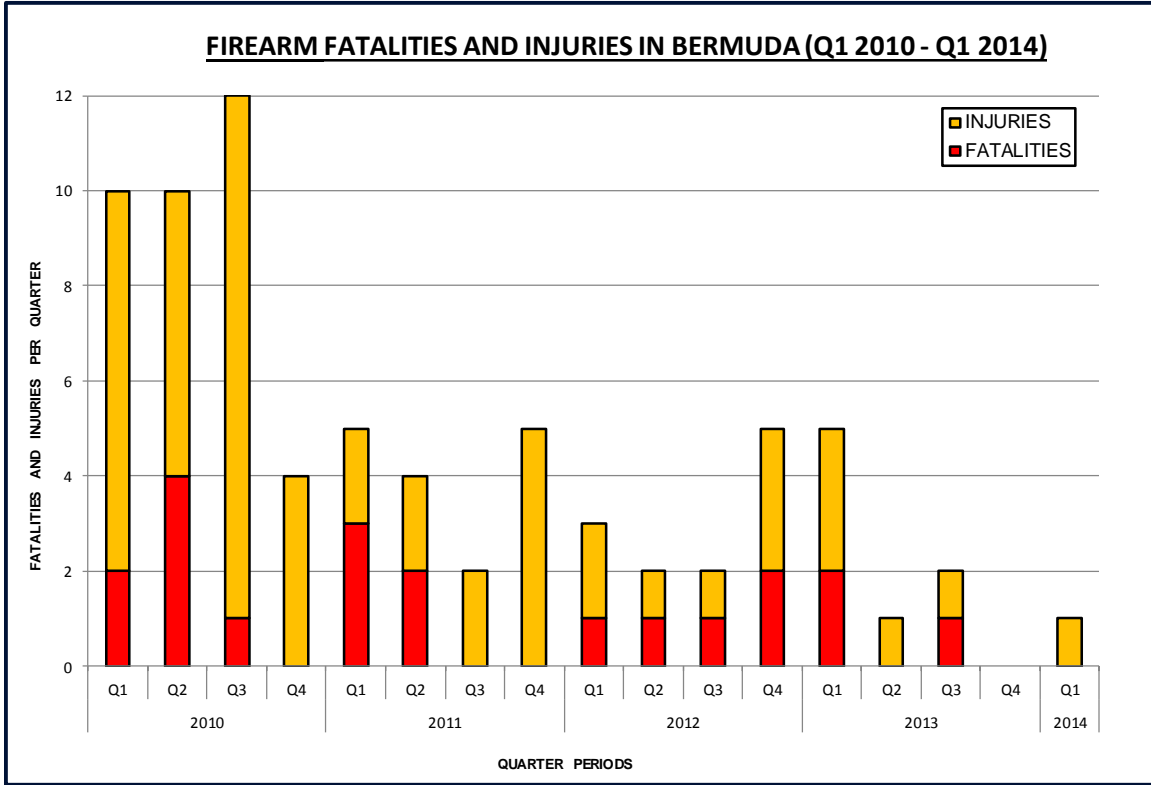


² To enable accurate recording, analysis and reporting of firearm incidents, the BPS classifies firearm incidents into 2 categories which are split into **Confirmed** or **Recovery Of A Firearm and Or Ammunition**. A **Confirmed** incident is where a person has been shot (fatally or wounded), a person has been shot at and corroboration is provided by forensic recovery of ballistic material, CCTV footage showing a firearm, reliable witness testimony or a person is charged with a firearms offence connected to the incident, a firearm is used in the commission of a criminal act and corroboration has been obtained, or a report of a firearm discharged and forensic material (bullet casings) have been recovered. A **Recovery Of A Firearm and Or Ammunition** is where a firearm, ammunition or imitation firearm is recovered by police.

4.2 FIREARM TRENDS

In Q1 2014 there was **1** firearm recovered, **0** fatalities, **1** injury and **2** individuals were arrested for firearms offences. The total number of persons shot since Q1 2010 is **73**, of which **20** have been fatal shootings. Figure 7 (below) shows firearm fatalities and injuries from Q1 2010 to Q1 2014:

5. CRIMES AGAINST THE COMMUNITY

5.1 SUMMARY

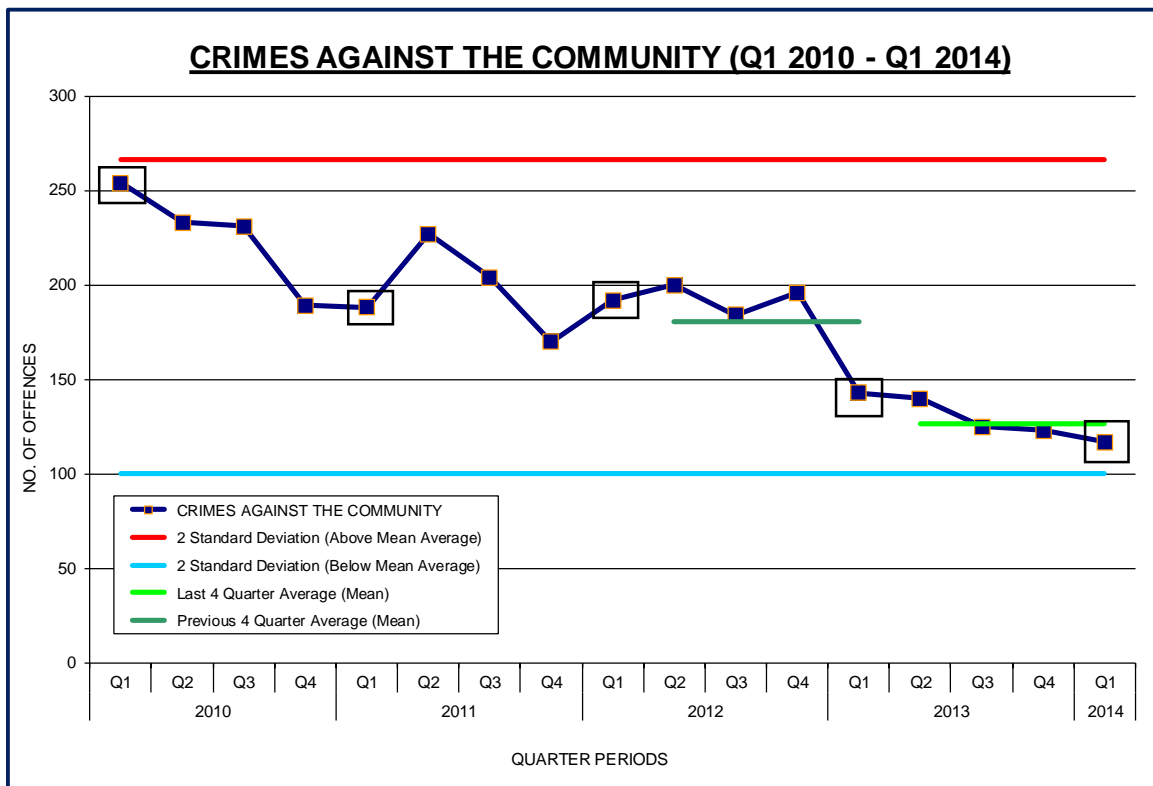
Figure 8: Crimes Against The Community (Last 5 Quarters Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Crimes Against The Community offences in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-6** offences or **-4.9%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-26** offences or by **-18.2%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **117** as can be seen in Figure 8:

5.2 TRENDS

Q1 2014 has the lowest recorded number of offences since 2000 which shows that the long term trend continues to **decrease**. However, the majority of areas have shown **increases**, such as in Anti-Social Behaviour (**+6**), Other Weapon Offences (**+6**) and Firearm Offences (**+1**). Disorder Offences (**-12**) and Animal Offences (**-7**) have **decreased** when compared to Q4 2013. A summary of Crimes Against The Community for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 9, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

6. CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

6.1. SUMMARY

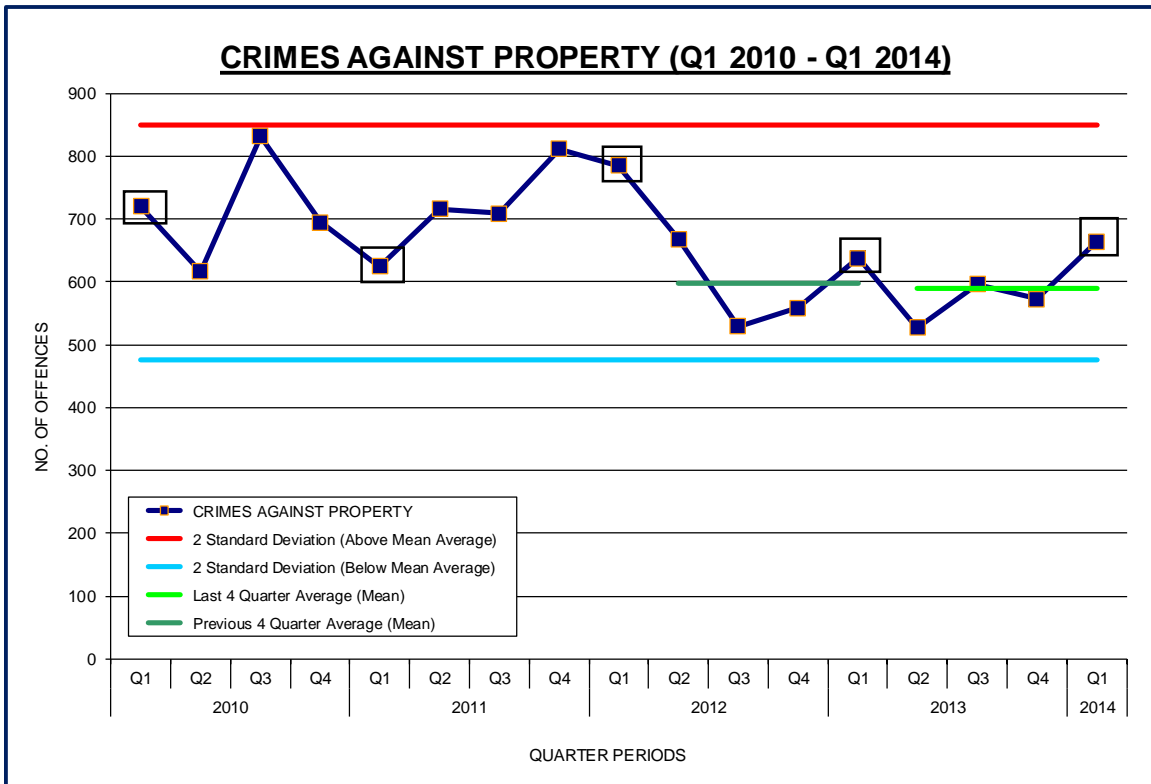
Figure 10: Crimes Against Property (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Crimes Against Property offences in Q1 2014 **increased** by **+91** offences or **+15.9%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **increased** by **+26** offences or by **+4.1%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **664** as can be seen in Figure 10:

6.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against Property has **decreased**. When compared to Q4 2013, the most notable crime of Q1 2014 within the Crimes Against Property category was Motor vehicle Theft (**+84**) and Theft of Property (**+9**). Burglary (Residential) has **increased** from **115** offences in Q4 2013 to **141** offences in Q1 2014, Burglary (Non-Residential) has **decreased** from **49** offences in Q4 2013 to **21** in Q1 2014 and Burglary (Tourist Accommodation) has also **decreased** from **3** offences in Q4 2013 to **0** offences in Q1 2014. 7. TRAFFIC COLLISIONS

7.1 SUMMARY

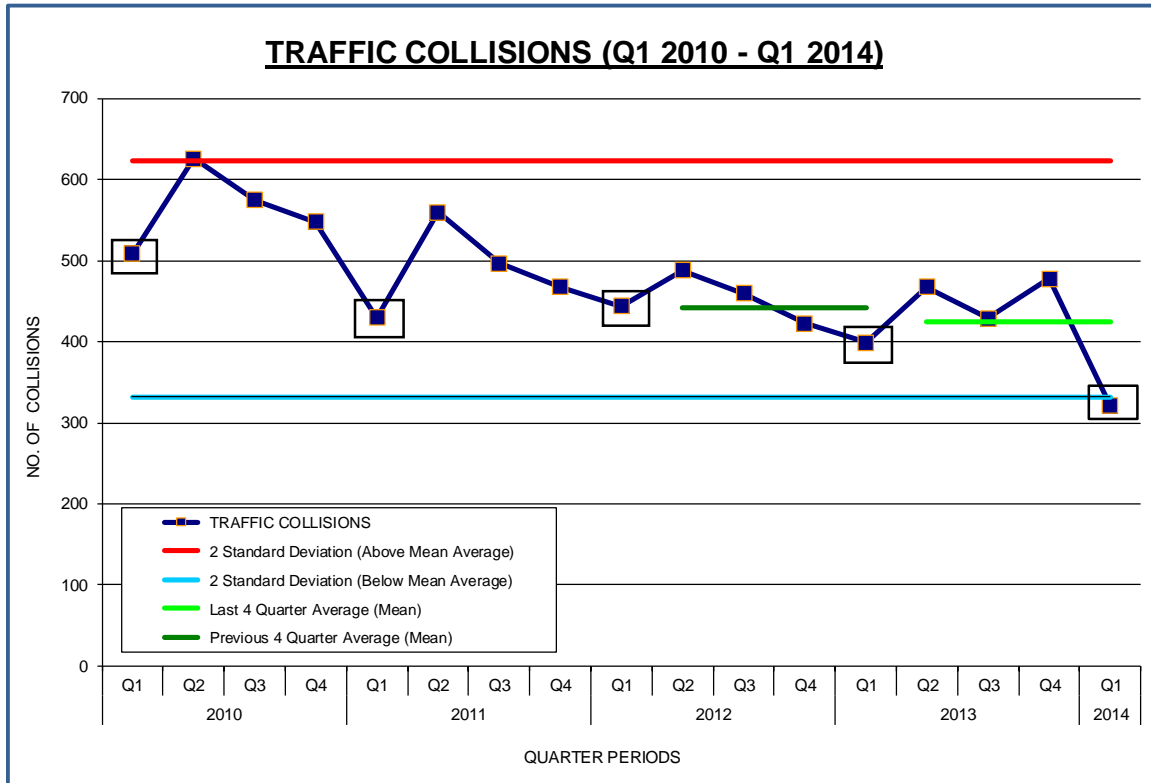
Figure 12: Traffic Collisions (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Traffic Collisions³ in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-157** or **-32.8%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-78** or **-19.5%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **321** as can be seen below in Figure 12:

7.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Traffic Collisions continues to **decrease** from over **600** per quarter in 2008; Q1 2014 had the lowest number of cases recorded since figures began being collated in Q1 2007. There were **4** fatalities in Q1 2014 which is an **increase** of **+2** when compared to Q4 2013. Serious injury collisions **decreased** from **32** in Q4 2013 to **31** in Q1 2014 and slight injury collisions **decreased** from **181** in Q4 2013 to **95** in Q1 2014. 8. DRUG ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

Drug Enforcement Activity refers to policing activity against drugs seized at the border, or activity that has led to arrests or seizures in Bermuda.

8.1 SUMMARY

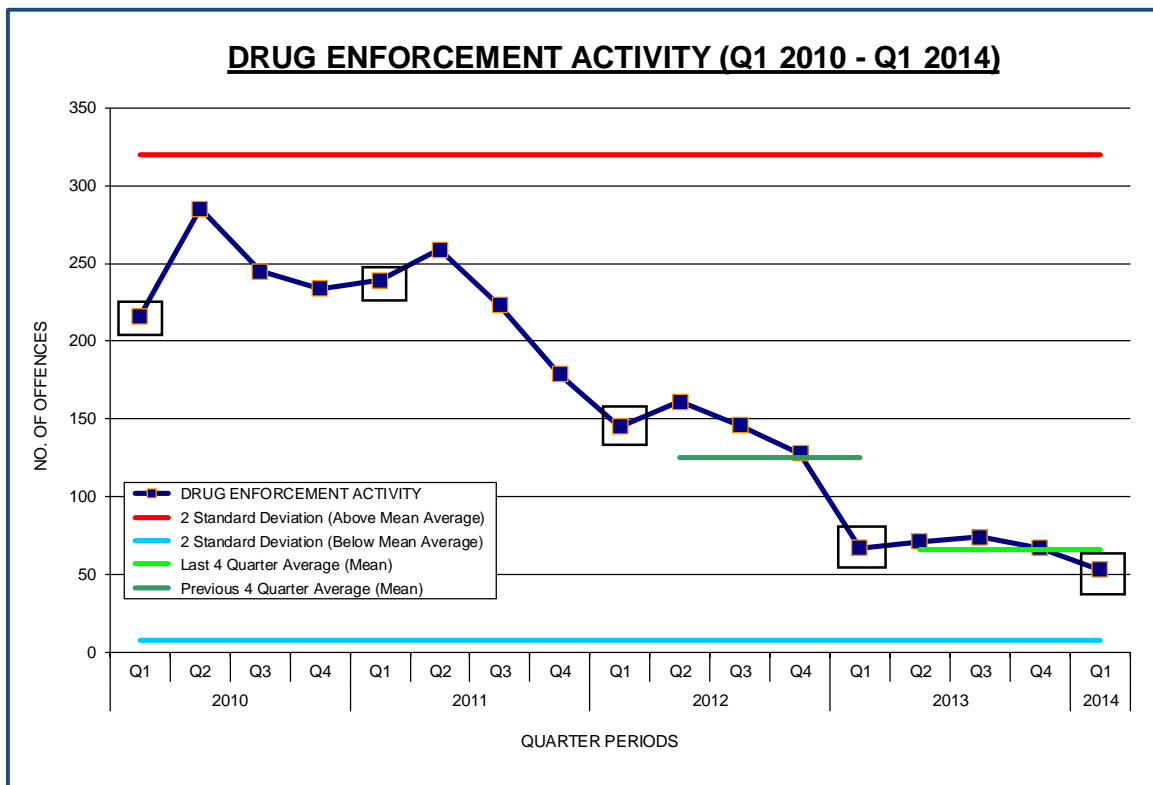
Figure 14: Drug Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Drug Enforcement Activity in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-14** or **-20.9%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has also **decreased** by **-14** offences or **-20.9%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **53** as can be seen in Figure 14:

8.2 TRENDS

Drug Enforcement Activity has **decreased** in Q1 2014 when compared to Q4 2013; this is the lowest number of cases recorded since figures began being collated in Q1 2007. 8.3 Drug Seizures

The Bermuda Police Service continues to work with its partners both locally and overseas to disrupt the trafficking of controlled drugs. These partners include HM Customs Bermuda, U.S. Customs and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. Despite these partnerships, controlled drugs are still entering Bermuda which is evidenced in the number of 'street' level drug seizures. This can be seen in Figure 16, which shows Drug Seizures By Location:

As can be seen in Figure 16, the majority of drugs seized are at street level (**58**) while there were **16** seizures at ports (including LF Wade) and **1** overseas seizure which involved overseas law enforcement agencies.

An estimated total of **7.7kg** of controlled drugs with an estimated street value of **\$420,949** has been seized in Q1 2014. Cannabis was the most drug commonly seized with **7.1kg** seized at a value of **\$356,314**, Cannabis Resin was the next highest, with **0.6kg** seized at an estimated street value of **\$60,894**. In addition **12g** of Crack Cocaine was seized with an estimated street value of **\$3,741**. The type, weight and value of the drugs seized broken down by Port, Street and Overseas seizures can be seen below in Figure 17:

In comparison to Q4 2013, the value of drugs seized in Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **\$374,430**, with an estimated street value of **\$420,949** compared to **\$795,379** in Q4 2013. This is due to the decrease in seizures of Cocaine and Heroin at street, port and overseas levels.

⁴ Of note, from Q1 2014 the \$ value per gram of heroin has been amended from \$267 to \$2943.

9. TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

9.1 SUMMARY

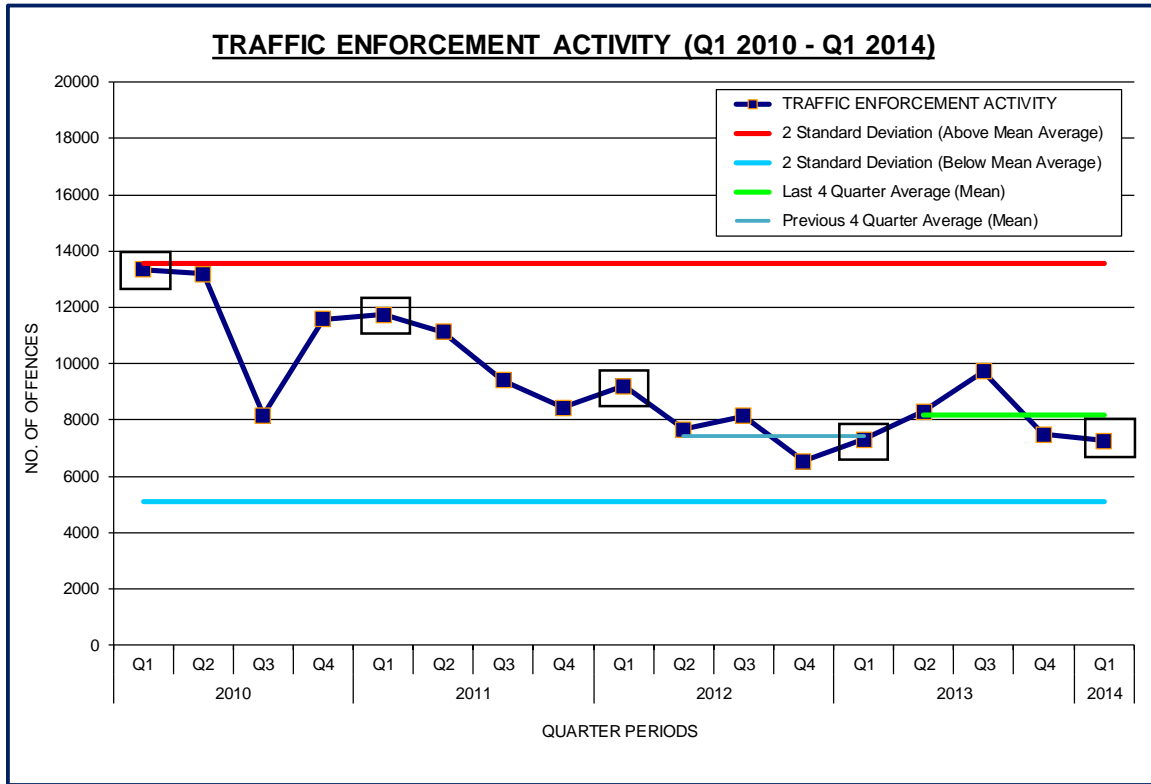
Figure 18: Traffic Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Traffic Enforcement Activity in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-213** or **-2.8%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-46** or **-0.6%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **7,266** as shown below in Figure 18:

9.2 TRENDS

Traffic Enforcement Activity has fluctuated between a low of **6,532** in Q4 2012 to a high of **16,342** in Q4 2009. With **7,266** offences in Q1 2014, overall Traffic Enforcement Activity continues to **decrease**. The most notable offence of Q1 2014 within the Traffic Enforcement category was Parking Offences which saw an **increase** of **+1416** when compared to Q4 2013. This comprised of **497** tickets issued for Speeding, **178** tickets issued for Disobeying a Traffic Sign and **143** tickets issued for Use of a Handheld. The summary of Traffic Enforcement Activity for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 19, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

10. INCIDENTS - CALLS FOR SERVICE

10.1 SUMMARY

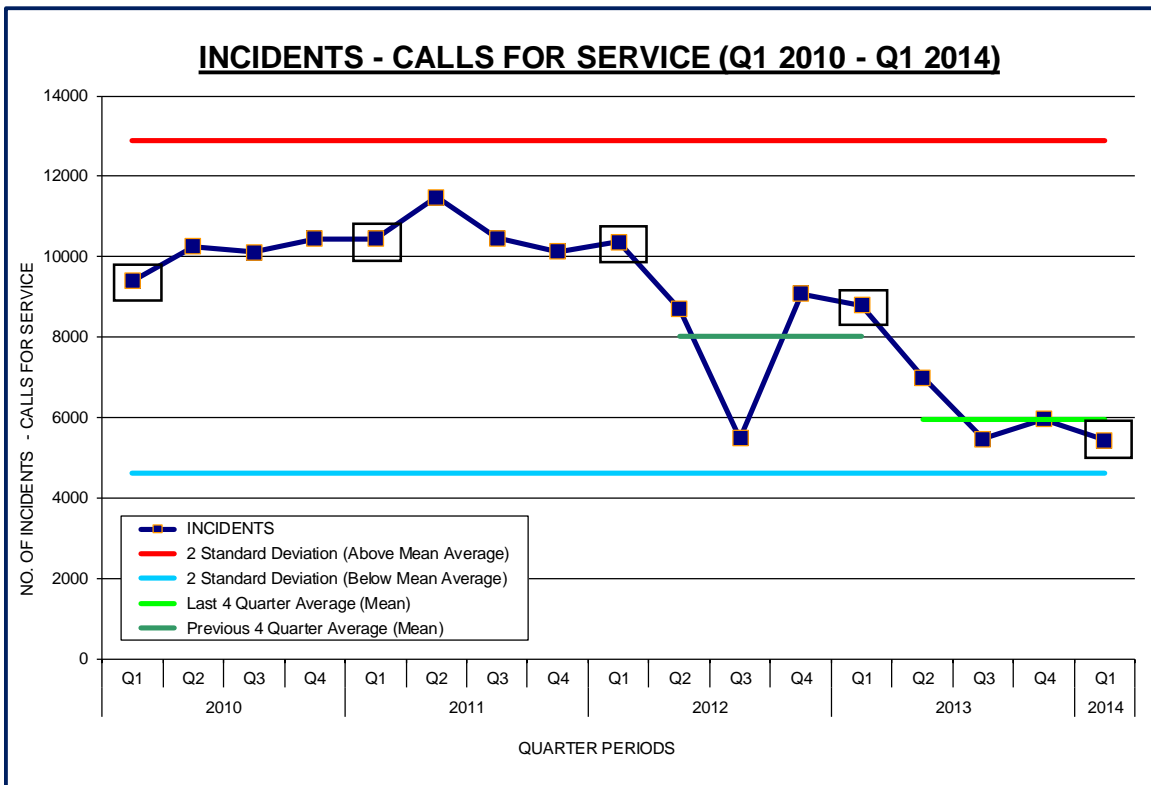
Figure 20: Incidents - (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Incidents refer to all police activity and also to calls for service that have been recorded on the police computer system (New World System). Incidents in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-524** or **-8.8%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-3,352** or **-38.1%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **5,437** as shown in Figure 20:

10.2 TRENDS

Q1 2014 saw a **decrease** in the number of incidents being recorded in comparison to Q4 2013, after **8** consecutive quarters of more than **10,000** incidents between Q2 2010 to Q1 2012, Q1 2014 is the 8th consecutive quarter where fewer than **10,000** incidents have been recorded. 11. ARRESTS - ALL OFFENCES

11.1 SUMMARY

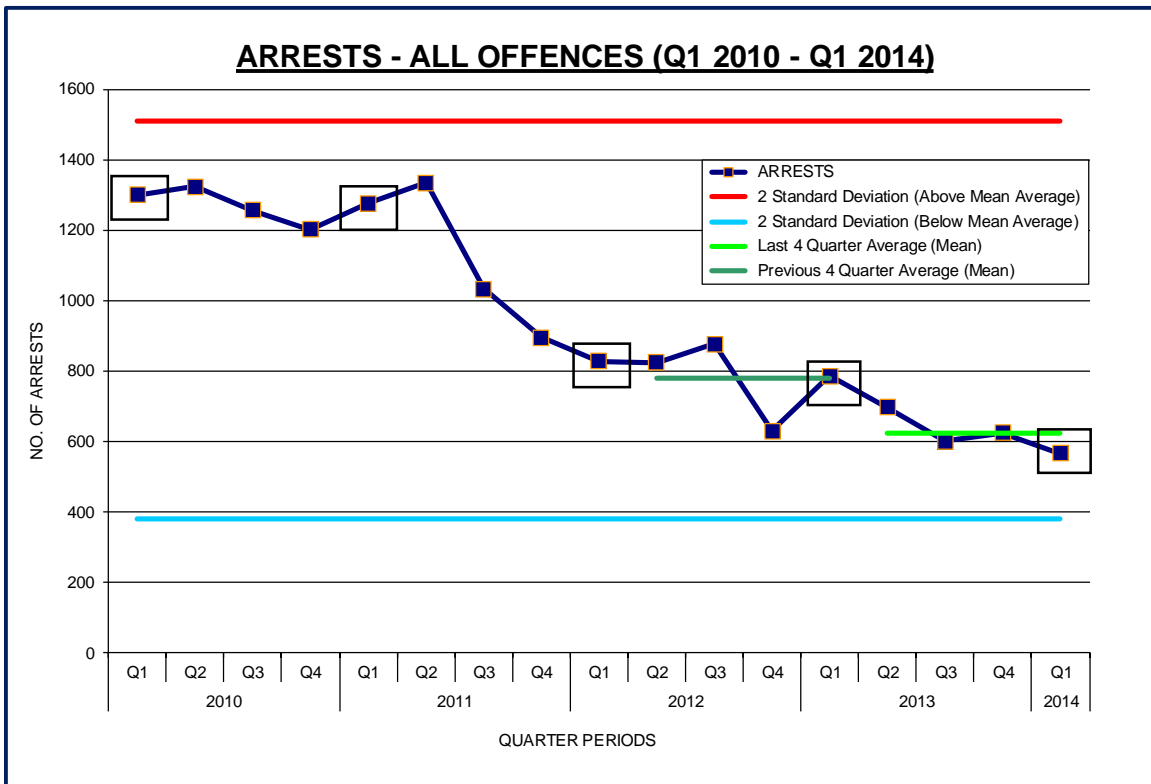
Figure 22: Arrests - All Offences (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

Arrests refer to those persons arrested and brought into police custody. Arrests in Q1 2014 **decreased** by **-58** or **-9.3%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-219** or **-27.9%**. The total for Q1 2014 was **567** as shown in Figure 22:

11.3 GENDER

Of the **567** persons arrested in Q1 2014, **468** were male and **99** were female.

11.4 AGE

Analysis of persons arrested by age revealed that individuals from 26 to 35 years of age were arrested more frequently than any other age group (**156**), followed closely by those aged 18 to 25 (**142**). A breakdown of persons arrested by their age group can be seen below in Figure 24:

11.5 NATIONALITY

Of the **567** persons arrested in Q1 2014 **532** were Bermudian and **35** were foreign nationals.

11.6 ETHNICITY

The majority of individuals arrested were black (**512**), with **39** individuals being white. In addition, **2** of those arrested were Asian, **2** individuals were classified as 'black and other' and **8** individuals fell into the category 'other'. 12. STOP AND SEARCHES

12.1 SUMMARY

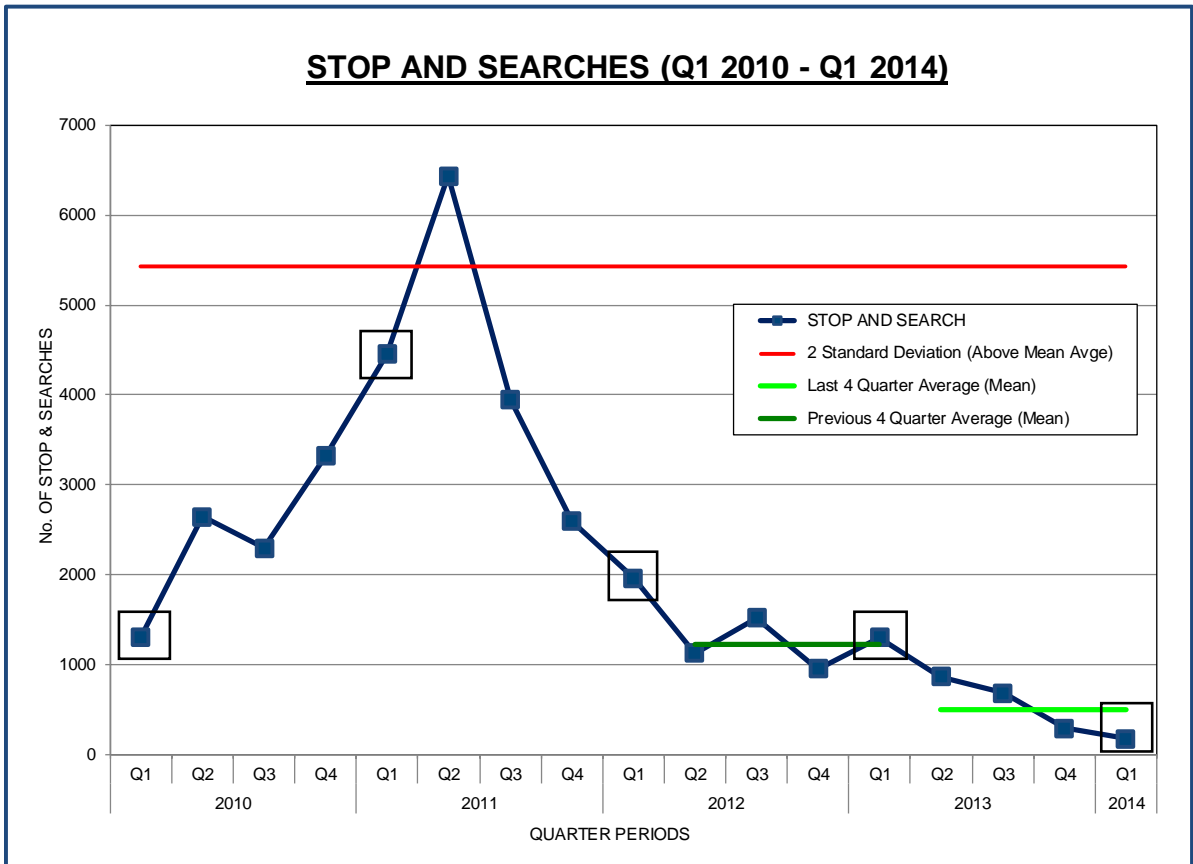
Stop and Searches are conducted in a proportionate and accountable manner and only when Police Officers have occasion to exercise lawful powers. They are carried out with courtesy, consideration and respect for the individual being stopped. While the figures are not performance indicators, they are a reflection of the frequency of engagement between proactive Police Officers and Prolific Priority Offenders. They provide an indication of police activity, particularly regarding the number of highly visible patrols in the community.

There were **175** Stop and Searches in Q1 2014, a **decrease** of **-116** or **-39.9%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to Q1 2013, Q1 2014 has **decreased** by **-1125** or **-86.5%**. Figure 27 shows the last 5 quarters and a summary of Stop & Searches for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 28, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

13. PROCEEDS OF CRIME ACT (POCA) SEIZURES

13.1 SUMMARY

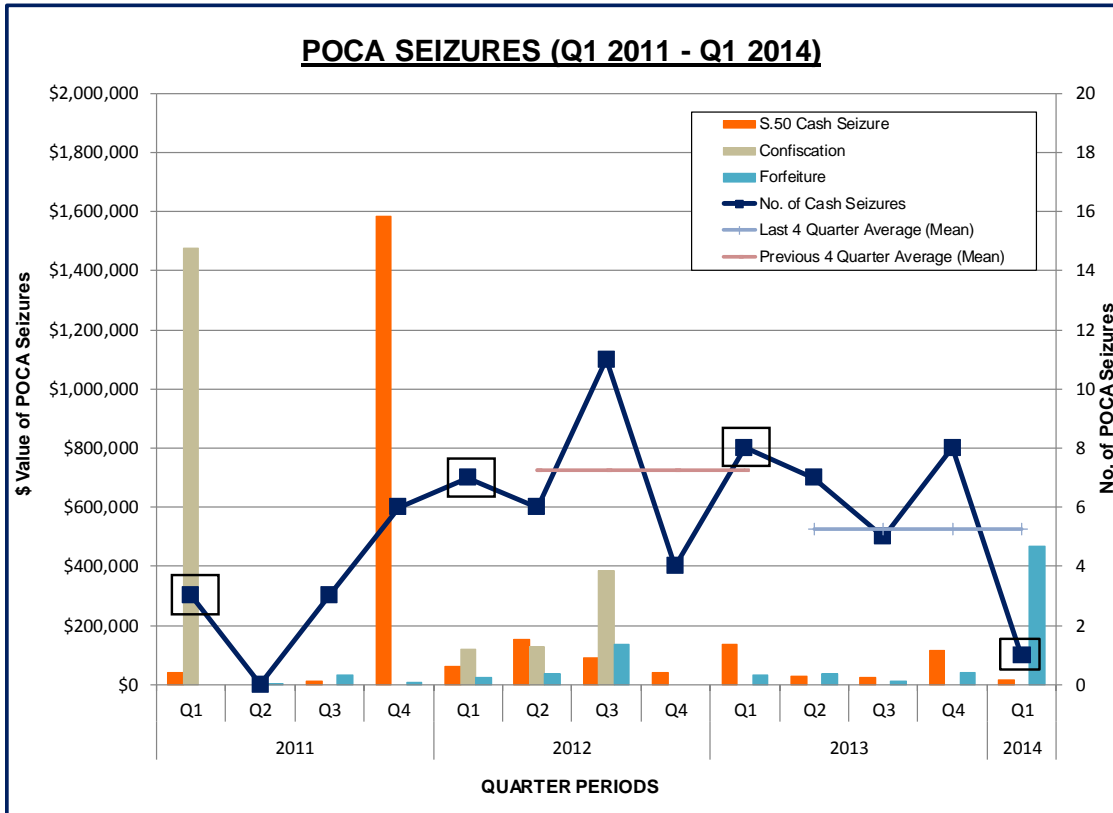
Figure 29: POCA – Cash Seizures (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2013 – Q1 2014)

There was **1** cash seizure in Q1 2014, a **decrease** of **-7** or **-87.5%** compared to Q4 2013. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2013), Q1 2014 has also **decreased** by **-7** or **-87.5%**. The total amount of cash seized under S.50 in Q1 2014 was **\$13,900.00**, which is a **decrease** of **-\$100,535.00** when compared to Q4 2013 (**\$114,435**) with an additional **\$469,427.96** recovered from Forfeiture. This can be seen in Figures 29, 30 and 31 showing POCA Cash Seizures:
