1.1 Security Classification

This document is marked as **UNCLASSIFIED** as there are no sensitive details contained in it and it is expressly written to be circulated both internally and externally of the Bermuda Police Service (BPS).

The statistics, tables and graphs contained in this document are based on substantiated cases, which are active investigations of an incident that has definitely happened. This is as opposed to using incident data, which is an initial recording of a crime that has yet to be substantiated. The numbers included in this document are therefore not expected to change, however there is always the possibility of mechanical or human error. Some categories only have data from Q1 2008 or Q1 2009. Where this is the case, Q3 2009 is always compared to Q3 2008 unless stated. Data integrity and data collection are both being actively progressed within the BPS to address these issues.

While every effort is made to ensure that the information contained in this report is accurate, the BPS makes no warranty, representation or guarantee as to the content, sequence, accuracy, timeliness or completeness of any data or information provided. 1.3 Explanation Of Graphs

The graphs used in this report include standard deviation, which has been used as a means of objectively measuring how much the crime rate has varied over time and is useful in identifying extreme highs and lows of crime. Standard deviation has been used so that where the crime rate is above the red line (2 standard deviation above the mean average), it is considered exceptionally high. Where the crime rate is below the blue line (2 standard deviation below the mean average), it is considered exceptionally low. In both cases it can be referred to as statistically significant (high or low) and is an indication of whether the quarterly statistics are exceptionally high or exceptionally low.

1.4 Aim

The aim of this report is to produce accurate, timely, objective information that:

- Enables informed decisions to be made on the types of crime that threatens the safety of the community.
- Is used to proactively manage risks to the island and ensure effective policing, redeploying and directing resources at a strategic and tactical level, as required.
- Facilitates effective and open communication with our stakeholders, developing the means to inform them of the plans, efforts and progress being made by the BPS.

 Provides meaningful information as one of the means of reassuring communities in Bermuda.

1.5 Executive Summary

The long term trend for all crime over the last 4 years (01-July-2005 to 30-September-2009) is **increasing**. Excluding Drug and Traffic Enforcement Activity (which distort the figures), Q3 2009 is <u>64 offences higher</u> than Q2 2009. However, in comparison to the same period last year, Q3 2009 is only <u>13 offences higher</u> than Q3 2008. A summary of the 3 key crime headings and 20 crime categories is shown below in figure 1:

As can be seen in Figure 1 above, 10 of the 20 crime categories have increased compared to Q2 2009, with 8 crime categories increasing in comparison to Q3 2008. The long term (4 year trend) for Crimes Against The Person, Crimes Against Property, Crimes Against The Community and All Crime is increasing.

2. ALL CRIME

2.1 SUMMARY


Figure 2: All Crime (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

The total for all crime in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **64** offences or **4.64** % compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by **13** offences or by **0.91** %. The total for Q3 2009 was **1,444** as can be seen in Figure 2:

2.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of all crime in Bermuda has been increasing over the last 17 quarters, despite Q1 2009 being the third lowest figure with **1,206** offences. Q3 2009 has registered the fourth highest quarterly figure in the last 17 quarters and is the highest Q3 figure in the last 17 quarters and is shown in Figure 3, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

3. CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

3.1 SUMMARY


Figure 4: Crimes Against the Person (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Crimes Against the Person offences in Q3 2009 <u>decreased</u> by -6 offences or -2.40 % compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by 42 offences or by 20.79 %. The total for Q3 2009 was 244 as can be seen in Figure 4:

3.2. TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, offences ranged between a low of **144** in Q1 2006 to a high of **258** offences in Q2 2008. The long term trend of Crimes Against the Person is **increasing** with Q3 2009 recording the third highest quarterly figure for the last four years and it is notable that Q3 2009 is also the highest third quarter figure. The slight decrease in Q3 2009 compared to Q2 2009 is due to serious assaults decreasing from **37** to **29** offences (a **28%** decrease), however the crime category of Other Assaults is at its highest on record with **162** offences. This crime category includes offences where minor injury has been sustained such as common assault. Crimes Against the Person for the last 17 quarters is shown in Figure 5, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

4. CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

4.1. SUMMARY


Figure 6: Crimes Against Property (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Crimes Against Property offences in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **110** offences or **12.44%** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>decreased</u> by -**45** offences or by -**4.33** %. The total for Q3 2009 was **994** as can be seen in Figure 6:

4.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, offences ranged between a low of **828** in Q1 2009 to a high of **1,039** offences in Q3 2008. The long term trend of Crimes Against Property is increasing slightly, however every year Q3 has historically been the peak of Crimes Against Property offences. The increase in Q3 2009 was primarily due to the crime categories of Burglary (Residential) and Theft of Property increasing. Burglary (Residential) is at its highest point with **229** offences; however Non Residential and Tourist Accommodation burglaries are at their lowest in comparison to previous years. Crimes Against Property for the last 17 quarters is shown in Figure 7, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

5. CRIMES AGAINST THE COMMUNITY

5.1 SUMMARY


Figure 8: Crimes Against The Community (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Crimes Against The Community offences in Q3 2009 <u>decreased</u> by **40** offences or -16.26 % compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by **16** offences or **8.42**%. The total for Q3 2009 was **206** as can be seen in Figure 8:

5.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, offences ranged between a low of **126** in Q1 2006 to a high of **246** offences in Q2 2009. The long term trend of Crimes Against The Community is increasing after being steady over the last 4 years. It is of note that Q2 and Q3 2009 are the only quarters above 200 offences. The recent decrease in Q3 2009 is mainly due to the decrease in the crime category Anti-Social Behaviour, which has decreased by **18%** from **173** in Q2 2009 to **141** in Q3 2009 and has almost brought the offence rate down to previous levels. Crimes Against The Community for the last 17 quarters is shown in Figure 9, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

6. TRAFFIC COLLISIONS

6.1 SUMMARY


Figure 10: Traffic Collisions (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Traffic Collisions in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **33** or **5.90%** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>decreased</u> by **-30** or by **-4.82%**. The total for Q3 2009 was **592** as can be seen in Figure 10:

6.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, Traffic Collisions ranged between a low of **508** in Q1 2009 to a high of **827** in Q3 2007. The long term trend of Traffic Collisions is decreasing and at a noticeable rate. It is of note that Q3 2009 is now the third quarter in a row where less than 600 traffic collisions have been recorded. There have been **11** fatal collisions in the first 3 quarters of 2009 compared to **13** in the same period in 2008. Traffic Collisions for the last 17 quarters is shown in Figure 11, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

6.3 POLICE TRAFFIC COLLISONS


Figure 12: Police Traffic Collisions (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Police Traffic Collisions in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **8** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has also <u>increased</u> by **8**. The total for Q3 2009 was **18** of which **13** were no injury collisions and **5** were injury collisions. The percentage figure shown in Figure 12 will fluctuate due to the small set of numbers being compared; however it has been left in this format to provide continuity in this report so that all the sections are similar. Q3 Figures can be seen in Figure 12:

6.4 TRENDS

The long term trend of Police Traffic Collisions has been decreasing over the last 17 quarters, despite Q3 2009 being the highest figure since Q2 2007. Q3 2009 has registered the fourth highest quarterly figure in the last 17 quarters and is the second highest Q3 figure on record. Police Traffic Collisions broken down into injury and no injury collisions for the last 17 quarters is shown in Figure 13, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

7. DRUG ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

Drug Enforcement Activity refers to policing activity against drugs seized at the border, or activity that has led the to arrest or seizures in Bermuda.

7.1 SUMMARY

Drug Enforcement Activity in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **29** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has also <u>increased</u> by **39**. The total for Q3 2009 was **140** as can be seen in Figure 14:

7.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, offences ranged between a low of **75** in Q4 2007 to a high of **167** offences in Q3 2005. The long term trend of Drug Enforcement Activity is that of a decrease from Q3 2005 until Q4 2007 and then an increase to Q3 2009. It is of note that Q3 2009 is now the third quarter in a row showing an increase and it is also 60% higher than one year ago (Q4 2008). Drug Enforcement Activity for the last 17 quarters can be seen below in Figure 15:

8. TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

8.1 SUMMARY


Figure 16: Traffic Enforcement Activity (Q3 2008 - Q3 2009)

Traffic Enforcement Activity in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **1,966** or **15.84%** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has also <u>increased</u> but by a figure of **4,436** or by **44.63%**. This data includes marine offences, impaired driving, traffic offences and parking offences, with the last two accounting for almost 99% of the figures. The data provided is only since Q1 2008 due to a change in recording methods. The total for Q3 2009 was **14,376** as can be seen in Figure 16:

8.2 TRENDS

In the last 7 quarters, Traffic Enforcement Activity ranged between a low of **6,814** in Q1 2008 to a high of **14,376** in Q3 2009. The long term trend is increasing however this is distorted by recent recording methods, particularly in parking offences. It is expected that the levels of Traffic Enforcement Activity will not have such a large variation in future quarters as shown below in Figure 17 for the last 7 quarters:

9. FIREARM REPORTS

Firearm Offences are included in Crimes Against The Community (Section 5); however Firearm Reports may not necessarily be recorded as offences, as often there is no suspect or even victim. Firearm Reports are split into two separate categories of confirmed reports and unconfirmed reports. Confirmed reports can be proven forensically e.g. by finding a firearm or ammunition. Unconfirmed reports are those where there is no forensic evidence e.g. a person or persons hear what they believe to be a shot or shots being fired. It may be a car backfiring or another noise and cannot be investigated further. The data provided is only since Q1 2008 due to a change in recording methods.

9.1 SUMMARY

Firearm Reports in Q3 2009 <u>decreased</u> by -6 or -33.33% compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by 2 offences or 20.0%. The total for Q3 2009 was 12 as can be seen in Figure 18:

9.2 TRENDS

2008 Firearm Reports

During 2008, there were a total of **50** recorded incidents involving firearms. Of these reports **14** have been confirmed whether by the recovery of a firearm or ammunition or by injury/damage to property or victims. These **14** confirmed reports did not include prohibited weapons such as spear guns, paint guns and a starter pistol.


There were **36** unconfirmed reports in 2008 including reports of gun shots heard: **(4)**, report of weapon used or seen **(14)**, reports of future violence involving Firearms **(6)**, information as a result of an investigation **(4)** and the arrests without physical seizure at the time of the arrest of suspects **(5)**.

2009 Firearm Reports

During the firsts 3 quarters of 2009, there were a total of **46** recorded incidents involving firearms. Of these reports **18** have been confirmed either by the recovery of bullets (**5**), recovery of firearms (**3**), physical injury or damage (**8**), and arrests with the recovery of firearms (**2**). There were **28** unconfirmed reports including gunshots heard (**4**), firearm seen (**21**) and the report of future violence using a firearm (**3**).

10. INCIDENTS - CALLS FOR SERVICE

10.1 SUMMARY


Figure 20: Arrests - All Offence (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

Incidents refer to all police activity and also to calls for service that has been recorded on the police computer system (New World System). Incidents in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by 11 or 0.11% compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by 3,058 or 43.25%. The total for Q3 2009 was 10,128 as can be seen in Figure 20:

10.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, police activity and the number of incidents ranged between **6,789** in Q1 2006 to **10,229** in Q1 2009. The long term trend has been relatively stable and kept around the 7,500 mark until a sharp increase in police activity in Q4 2008. This level has now remained stable and is above 10,000 for three successive quarters. It is suggested that both the number of calls for service as well as the amount of police activity has increased over the last 17 quarters as shown in Figure 21, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

11. ARRESTS - ALL OFFENCES

11.1 SUMMARY


Figure 22: Arrests - All Offences (3rd Quarter 2008 - 3rd Quarter 2009)

Arrests refer to those persons arrested and brought into police custody. Arrest data is provided since Q1 2008. Arrests in Q3 2009 increased by 210 or 19.91% compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 has increased by 445 or 54.27%. The total for Q3 2009 was 1,265 as shown in Figure 22:

11.2 TRENDS

In the last 17 quarters, arrests ranged between a low of 747 in Q2 2008 to a high of 1,265 in Q3 2009. The trend for arrests is increasing and it is suggested that this is due to PACE¹, the Safer Streets Initiative and a greater emphasis on proactive policing tactics and strategy. It is of note that more persons have been arrested in the first 3 quarters of 2009 than in all of 2008 (3,247 in Q1-Q3 2009 vs. 3,163 for all of 2008). Arrests for the last 7 quarters are shown in Figure 23, with the Q3 figures highlighted in boxes:

11.3 GENDER

¹ Police And Criminal Evidence Act (2006) was implemented on 7th September 2008. From this date, any offence that carried 3 months imprisonment or more was automatically an arrestable offence, increasing and simplifying the number of offences you can be arrested for.

Of the 1,265 persons arrested in Q3 2009, 1,074 were male and 191 were female.

11.4 AGE

Analysis of persons arrested by age revealed that individuals from 26 to 35 years old were arrested more frequently than any other age group (378). A breakdown of persons arrested by their age group can be seen below in Figure 24:

11.5 NATIONALITY

Of the **1,265** persons arrested in Q3 2009, **1,178** were Bermudian and **87** were foreign nationals.

11.6 ETHNICITY

The majority of individuals arrested were black (1,139), with 100 individuals being white. In addition, 5 of those arrested were Asian, 5 individuals fall into the category 'black and white', 2 individual falls under the category 'black and other', 1 individual falls under the category 'white and other' and 13 individuals fall into the category 'other'. A breakdown of persons arrested by their ethnicity can be seen below in Figure 25:

11.7 TYPE OF ARREST

Of the **1,265** persons arrested in Q3 2009, the most common offence was warrants with **700** arrested for apprehension, civil and SJA warrants. The second largest group was drug offences with **84** (with an additional **18** arrested for drug importation). There were **9** arrests for firearms offences and **93** arrested for either assault or affray. A breakdown of the offences persons were arrested for can be seen below in Figure 26:

11.8 RECIDIVISM

Of the **1,265** persons arrested in Q3 2009, **113** individuals were arrested more than once and accounted for **243** of the arrests for this period. These included a number of Prolific Priority Offenders.

12. STOP AND SEARCHES

Stop and Searches refers to the activity of Police Officers utilising their powers to stop and search a person where lawfully justified under PACE (2006), Criminal Code, Misuse of Drugs Act etc. These searches are conducted where there is reasonable grounds to suspect that the person has committed or is about to commit an arrestable offence and they are carried out with courtesy, consideration and respect for the individual being stopped. It provides an indication as to police activity, particularly in regards to patrolling in the community. PACE was implemented on 7th September 2008 and since then this policing activity has been specifically recorded.

12.1 SUMMARY

Stop and Searches in Q3 2009 <u>increased</u> by **133** or **19.82%** compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q4 2008, Q3 2009 has <u>increased</u> by **715** or **803.37%**. The total for Q3 2009 was **804** as can be seen in Figure 27:

It is suggested that the increase since the introduction of Stop and Search powers is as a result of officers becoming more used to and confident in the use of these powers. It is suggested that as Stop and Search activity has only been used for a year, comparisons in future quarterly reports will be able to provide greater meaning to this area of police activity and that year on year increases reported above will not show such a large percentage increase.

13. 315F AUTHORISATIONS

13.1 SUMMARY


Figure 28: 315F Searches (3rd Quarter comparison 2005 - 2009)

315F Authorisations refer to police activity where a search authorisation under the provisions of the criminal code is in effect and gives officers the ability to stop and search persons in a specified geographical area who may be involved in anticipation of violence or the carriage of weapons of offence. 315F Authorisations in Q3 2009 decreased by -12 compared to Q2 2009. In comparison to Q3 2008, Q3 2009 315F Searches increased by 11. The total for Q3 2009 was 14 as can be seen in Figure 28:
