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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 SECURITY CLASSIFICATION

This document is marked as **UNCLASSIFIED** as there are no sensitive details contained in it and it is expressly written to be circulated both internally and externally.

1.2 DATA INTEGRITY

The statistics, tables and graphs contained in this document are based on substantiated cases, which are active investigations of an incident that has definitely happened. This is as opposed to using incident data, which is an initial recording of a crime that has yet to be substantiated.

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1.3 EXPLANATION OF GRAPHS

The graphs used in this report include standard deviation, which has been used as a means of objectively measuring how much the crime rate has varied over time and is useful in identifying extreme highs and lows of crime. Standard deviation has been used so that where the crime rate is above the red line (2 standard deviation above the mean average), it is considered exceptionally high. Where the crime rate is below the blue line (2 standard deviation below the mean average), it is considered exceptionally low. In both cases it can be referred to as statistically significant (high or low) and is an indication of whether the quarterly statistics are exceptionally high or exceptionally low.

<u>1.4 AIM</u>

The aim of this report is to produce accurate, timely, objective information that:

- Enables informed decisions to be made on the types of crime that threaten the safety of the community.
- Is used to proactively manage risks to the island and ensure effective policing, redeploying and directing resources at a strategic and tactical level, as required.
- Facilitates effective and open communication with our stakeholders, developing the means to inform them of the plans, efforts and progress being made by the BPS.
- Provides meaningful information as one of the means of reassuring communities in Bermuda.

1.5 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2010 there were **7** people killed and **29** people injured though the use of firearms. This represents a significant increase over 2009 which recorded **4** and **13** respectively. Across all other areas, **crime is at its lowest point in the last decade**. Significant resources and several strategies were deployed in 2010 to target gun, gang and drug offences as the primary objectives for the police and the community. The 2010 Annual Policing Plan announced a new, single-focused Mission Statement for the BPS: "**Making Bermuda Safer**." There were **1,065** offences in Q4 2010, making it the second lowest quarter since Q1 2000. There were **4,575** offences for the whole of 2010, making **2010** the lowest yearly figure from comparative available records (from 2000).

Police enforcement and proactivity is at an all time high with arrests increasing by **11%**, calls for service up **2%**, stop and searches up **36%** and drug seizures at a record of \$29.5M. A summary of the 3 key crime headings and 20 crime categories for quarter on quarter, year on year and the 5 year trend is shown below in figure 1:

2. ALL CRIME

2.1 SUMMARY


Figure 3: All Crime (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

The total for All Crime in Q4 2010 decreased by -193 offences or -15.3% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was a decrease of -738 offences or -14.2% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 1,065 and the total for 2010 was 4,575 as can be seen below in Figures 2 and 3:

2.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of All Crime in Bermuda is now showing a substantial decrease, with Q4 2010 being the second lowest quarter since Q1 2000 and 2010 the lowest year for All Crime since 2000. Crime Against The Person is now at its lowest since Q1 2006 and Crime Against Property is now the second lowest quarter since Q1 2000. Crimes Against The Community registered a quarter on quarter decrease and a +1% increase year on year, with just +9 additional offences. This can be seen in Figure 4, which shows All Crime for the last 20 quarters, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

3. CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

3.1 SUMMARY


Figure 6: Crimes Against the Person (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

Crimes Against the Person in Q4 2010 decreased by -14 offences or -7.2% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was a decrease of -121 offences or -13.1% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 181 and the total for 2010 was 804 as can be seen below in Figures 5 and 6:

3.2. TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against The Person has risen until Q4 2009, from where it has shown a continual decrease to the present quarter. With **181** offences in Q4 2010, it is the lowest quarterly figure since Q1 2006 and reinforces the trend that these offences are decreasing. In comparing 2010 and 2009, decreases were noted in Other Assaults (from **592** to **516** offences), Robbery (from **145** to **94)** and Offences Against Children (from **31** to **21**), leading to an overall year on year decrease of **-121**. A summary of Crimes Against The Person for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 7, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

4. FIREARM INCIDENTS

4.1 FIREARM TRENDS

Firearm Offences are included within Crimes Against The Community (Section 5); however firearm incidents may not necessarily be recorded as offences, as often there is no suspect or even a victim.

To enable accurate recording, analysis and reporting of firearm incidents, the BPS classifies them into 4 categories which are split into either **confirmed** or **unconfirmed**¹ categories. A confirmed incident is where forensic evidence proves the incident occurred e.g. a firearm has been seized, shell casings or bullets are recovered, or a person has a gun shot wound.




Figure 8: Firearm Incidents In Bermuda (2006 - 2010)

The number of confirmed and unconfirmed firearm incidents in 2010 was **197**. In 2010 confirmed firearm incidents doubled in comparison with 2009 and have doubled every year from 2007 to 2010, with **7** in 2007, **18** in 2008, **37** in 2009 and **70** in 2010. In the same time period, unconfirmed firearm incidents have almost trebled every year from 2007 to 2010, with **3** in 2007, **16** in 2008, **46** in 2009 and **127** in 2010. There has been a significant increase in firearm incidents year on year between 2007 and 2010. This can be seen in Figure 8 below, which shows firearm incidents between 2006 and 2010:

As can be seen in Figure 8, two thirds of firearm incidents in 2010 refer to forensically unconfirmed firearm incidents, namely 'Claims of Gunshots Heard' or 'Claims Of Firearms Seen'.

¹ Person Shot or Forensic Evidence Confirms Shooting and Recovery of A Firearm Including Imitation and Ammunition are classified as CONFIRMED, while Claims of Firearms Seen and Claims Of Gunshots Heard are classified as UNCONFIRMED.

4.2 FIREARM FATALITIES AND INJURIES

In 2010 there were **7** people killed and **29** people injured by firearms. This compares unfavourably to previous years where **4** were killed and **13** injured in 2009 and there was only **1** firearm related injury in 2008. This can be seen in figure 9, which shows deaths and injuries from firearms between 2006 and 2010:

The number of confirmed firearm incidents has increased in 2010, which can be seen in Figure 10 below, which breaks down confirmed firearm incidents between 2006 and 2010:

Of the **70** forensically confirmed incidents in 2010, **36** people were killed or injured in **30** separate incidents, with the other **40** incidents involving police recovering a part of a firearm, live ammunition or discharged ammunition.

Within the category 'Person Shot or Forensic Evidence Confirms Shooting' there were 7 separate incidents in 2010 where a person was killed, including one where 2 people were also injured. There were 4 incidents where 2 people were shot and injured, 19 incidents where 1 person was shot and injured and finally 9 incidents in 2010 where shots were fired, but no one was injured. The total of 39 is in contrast to previous years with only 14 such incidents in 2009 and 1 in 2008.

There were **127** unconfirmed firearm incidents in 2010. There has been an increase in 'Claims of Gunshots Heard' where members of the public are contacting Police when they have heard what they believe to be a firearm being discharged. In these incidents where no forensic evidence has been found by Police, they could be attributed to noises such as fireworks or an engine misfiring. The increase may be attributed to a willingness of the public to report such matters to the Police. This can be seen in Figure 11 overleaf, which breaks down unconfirmed firearm incidents between 2006 and 2010:

4.3 FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION

With regards to weapons seized by police in 2010, there were **7** firearms recovered by the Bermuda Police Service of .22, .32, .38 or **9mm** calibre plus **1** imitation firearm, **1** magazine to an automatic handgun and **2** air pistols. To give this some context, the confirmed firearm incidents have been classified into the type of weapons or ammunition seized. This is shown below in Figure 12:

4.4. FIREARM SUMMARY

There has been an increase in confirmed firearm incidents in 2010, in comparison to previous years. With **36** persons shot in 2010, **17** persons shot in 2009 and **1** person shot in 2008, it is clear that there has been an escalation in gang on gang violence in 2010, which has severely affected the quality of life of communities in Bermuda. Of the **197** firearm incidents in 2010, **127** or **65%** were forensically unconfirmed and classified as either 'Claims Of Firearms Seen' or Claims Of Firearms Heard'.

5. CRIMES AGAINST THE COMMUNITY

5.1 SUMMARY


Figure 14: Crimes Against The Community (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

Crimes Against The Community in Q4 2010 decreased by -42 offences or -18.2% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was an increase of +9 offences or +1% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 189 and the total for 2010 was 907 as can be seen below in Figures 13 and 14:

5.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against The Community is still slightly on the increase. However, with **189** offences in Q4 2010, it is the lowest quarterly figure since Q4 2008. In comparing 2010 and 2009, there was a substantial increase in Firearm Offences (from **38** to **120**) and Disorder Offences (from **128** to **138**). There were however decreases noted in Anti-Social Behaviour (from **636** to **567**) and Other Weapon Offences (from **90** to **74**), leading to an overall increase of **+9** offences in year on year comparison. A summary of Crimes Against The Community for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 15, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

6. CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

6.1 SUMMARY


Figure 17: Crimes Against Property (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

Crimes Against Property in Q4 2010 decreased by -137 offences or -16.5% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was a decrease of -646 offences or -18.4% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 695 and the total for 2010 was 2,864 as can be seen below in Figures 16 and 17:

6.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against Property continues to show a pronounced decrease over a 5 year period. With **695** offences in Q4 2010, it is the second lowest quarterly figure since Q1 2006 and reinforces the trend that these offences are decreasing. In comparing 2010 and 2009, decreases were noted in all 7 crime categories and particularly in Burglary Residential (from **774** to **553** offences), Theft Of Property (from **1,003** to **804**) and Criminal Damage (**470** to **345**) leading to an overall year on year decrease of **-646**. A summary of Crimes Against Property for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 18, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

7. TRAFFIC COLLISIONS

7.1 SUMMARY


Figure 20: Traffic Collisions (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

Traffic Collisions include fatal, serious injury, slight injury and damage only collisions. Traffic Collisions in Q4 2010 decreased by -27 or -4.7% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was a year on year decrease of -29 offences or -1.3%. The total for Q4 2010 was **548** and the total for 2010 was **2,258** as can be seen below in Figures 19 and 20:

7.2 TRENDS

Traffic Collisions have consistently decreased since a high of **827** in Q3 2007 and are now rarely above **600** per quarter. There were **5** Fatal Collisions in Q4 2010 compared to **1** in Q3 2010, however there were no differences in Fatal Collisions between 2010 and 2009, with **13** being recorded in both years. Although Serious Traffic Collisions increased year on year (from **136** to **144**) along with Damage Collisions (from **1,400** to **1,406**), Slight Injury Collisions decreased notably (from **738** to **695**). A summary of Traffic Collisions for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 21, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

8. DRUG ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

8.1 SUMMARY


Figure 23: Drug Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

Drug Enforcement Activity refers to the BPS and HM Customs (Bermuda) working with partners including U.S. Customs, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and the UK Serious and Organised Crime Agency to arrest persons or seize drugs. This may occur at the border, on the streets of Bermuda or take place overseas where drugs have been destined for Bermuda. Drug Enforcement Activity in Q4 2010 decreased by -11 or -4.5% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was an increase of +467 offences or +91% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 234 and the total for 2010 was 980 as can be seen below in Figures 22 and 23:

8.2 TRENDS

Drug Enforcement Activity has decreased slightly in Q4 2010 compared to Q3 2010, however the year on year trends continue to show substantial increases. To put this in perspective, the quarterly average was **81** in 2007, **93** in 2008, **128** in 2009 and **245** in 2010. A summary of Drug Enforcement Activity for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 24, with Q4 figures highlighted in boxes:

8.3 DRUG SEIZURES OVERVIEW

The greatest number of drug seizures in 2010 were at street level with **820** in 2010, while **138** were seizures at ports and **22** overseas seizures. This can be seen in Figure 25, which shows Drug Seizures in Bermuda in 2010 by location, by quarter:

With reference to Figure 25, analysis of street seizures identifies that 61% (597 seizures) have been conducted by a combination of the Police Support Unit, Gang Unit and Armed Response Vehicles whose remit is to focus on gangs, guns and violence. The Port seizures are predominantly those at LF Wade International Airport (BDA), however seizures at wharfs and from courier companies also feature. The officers of HM Customs Bermuda account for nearly half of all seizures made at ports of entry. The overseas seizures are as a result of close partnerships with other law enforcement agencies where joint enforcement and intelligence sharing have been conducted. The BPS Drugs Strategy has focused on 3 areas with the intention of disruption or interdiction to:

- 1. Stop drugs getting to Bermuda in the first place.
- 2. Stop drugs getting past Bermuda's ports of entry.
- 3. Stop drugs that are on the street.

8.4 DRUG SEIZURES IN Q4 2010

An estimated total of **411 Kg** of controlled drugs with an estimated street value of **\$21.4 million** was seized in Q4 2010. This is ten times the value seized in Q3 2010 and is the highest value of drugs seized in recent years. Cannabis was the most common drug seized in Q4 2010, with **400 Kg** seized at an estimated value of **\$20 million**. This was primarily due to the seizure of **318 Kg** from a vessel heading for Bermuda as well as two (U.S.) airport seizures where **80 Kg** was found in luggage destined for Bermuda. There were also seizures at BDA including separate incidents where **1 Kg crack cocaine** and **1 Kg cocaine** were seized from persons arriving in Bermuda.

Cocaine has been the second highest drug type seized in terms of weight and value for a number of quarters and in Q4 2010 it just remains in second place with **1.4 Kg** seized with an estimated value of **\$330,000**. Crack cocaine seizures were unusually high with just under **1.4 Kg** and cannabis resin seizures were just over **1.3 Kg**. Of the 212 street seizures, over 80% involved cannabis and the rest was split between crack cocaine (**18** seizures), heroin (**4** seizures) and cocaine, ecstasy and other drug equipment. There were also **14** cannabis plants seized from various Parishes in Q4 2010.

In summary, while the number of drug seizures in Q4 2010 was only slightly less than in Q3 2010, the quantity and therefore value of drugs seized has increased by a factor of

ten. This is due to three large seizures at ports and overseas amounting to **398 Kg** cannabis. The type of drugs seized has also changed with crack cocaine seized in greater amounts than usual. The type, weight and value of the drugs seized broken down by Port, Street and Overseas seizures in Q4 2010 can be seen below in Figure 26:

In 2010 the largest type of drug seized was cannabis, with **520 Kg**. Cannabis or cannabis resin accounted for **98%** of drugs seized by weight and **90%** of the value of drugs seized in 2010, indicating that it is the drug of choice for many in Bermuda. The vast majority of cannabis and cannabis resin was intercepted overseas and so did not even make it to Ports in Bermuda. Cocaine was the second largest type of drug seized in 2010 with **10Kg** seized and unlike cannabis or cannabis resin, most of this was seized at the Ports of Bermuda (including courier companies). In comparison to 2009, there has been a threefold increase in the value of drugs seized, as shown below in Figure 28:

9. TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

9.1 SUMMARY


Figure 30: Traffic Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Year Comparison 2009 - 2010)

Traffic Enforcement Activity is predominantly made up of any tickets for speeding and parking. Traffic Enforcement Activity in Q4 2010 increased by +3,418 or +41.8% compared to Q3 2010. In 2010 there was a decrease of -10,608 or -18.6% compared to 2009. The total for Q4 2010 was 11,586 and the total for 2010 was 46,290 as can be seen below in Figures 29 and 30:

9.2 TRENDS

The Q4 2010 figure of **11,586** is a substantial increase from Q3 2010, which was the lowest since Q1 2008. With the exception of the Q4 2010, Traffic Enforcement Activity has declined since Q4 2009. Year on year comparisons between 2010 represents an **-18.6%** decrease over 2009.


Figure 33: Incidents - Calls For Service (Last 5 Year Comparison 2006 - 2010)

In 2010 there was a year on year increase of +768 or +1.9% The total for Q4 2010 was 10,439 and the total for 2010 was 40,197 as can be seen below in Figures 32 and 33:

10.2 TRENDS

Q4 2010 is the highest quarter recorded since Q1 2005 and the long term trend is still on the increase. Year on year increases of +1.9% or +768 incidents represent a significant shift towards an overall increase in policing activity and Calls For Service. This reinforces the high rate of police activity which appears to be remaining above 10,000 incidents per quarter. 
Figure 36: Arrests - All Offences (2008 - 2010)

11.2 TRENDS

Arrests remained stable until Q1 2009 from where they have continued to rise to a high of **1,324** in Q2 2010. Arrests have dropped by -**54** in Q4 2010 in comparison to Q3 2010, however year on year comparisons show that there has been a yearly increase from **3,255** in 2008 to **4,556** in 2009 to **5,082** in 2010, as shown in Figure 36. 11.4 AGE

Analysis of persons arrested Q4 2010 by age revealed that individuals from 18 to 25 years of age were arrested more frequently than any other age group (352), followed closely by those aged 26 to 35 (332). In 2010, analysis of persons arrested by age revealed that individuals from 18 to 25 years of age were arrested more frequently than any other age group (1,480). By comparison, in 2009 there were slightly more persons arrested in the 26-35 age group (1,312) than in the 18-25 age group (1,247). 11.5 NATIONALITY

Of the **1,202** persons arrested in Q4 2010 **1,109** were Bermudian and **93** were foreign nationals. Of the **5,082** persons arrested in 2010, **4,667** were Bermudian and **415** were foreign nationals. By comparison, in 2009 of the **4,556** persons arrested, **4,217** were Bermudian and **339** were foreign nationals.

11.6 ETHNICITY

Of the 1,202 persons arrested in Q4 2010, **1,063** were black and **117** individuals were white. Of the **5,082** persons arrested in 2010, **4,554** were black, **433** were white, **11** were Asian and the rest (**84**) were classified as other. 11.7 TYPE OF ARREST

Of the **1,202** persons arrested in Q4 2010, the most common category was 'all other offences' which includes HMC, apprehension, SJA and civil warrants with **598**. In 2010 there were **2,520** persons arrested under this category. There were **29** arrests for Murder and **51** arrests for Firearms Offences in 2010. There were also **540** arrests for drug offences and **277** persons arrested for Anti-Social Behaviour in 2010. 11.8 REPEAT ARRESTS

Of the **1,202** persons arrested in Q4 2010, **98** were arrested more than once and accounted for **221** of the arrests for this period. Of these **98** persons, **7** were arrested **4** or more times and **48** were identified as **PPO's** (Prolific Priority Offenders) during Q4 2010. These **48** individuals account for **142** of the arrests effected during this period. In 2010, **23** persons were arrested **4** or more times, emphasizing the small minority of repeat offenders (PPOs) in Bermuda.

12. STOP AND SEARCHES²

12.1 SUMMARY

Stop and Searches are conducted in a proportionate and accountable manner and only when officers have occasion to exercise lawful powers. They are carried out with courtesy, consideration and respect for the individual being stopped. While the figures are not performance indicators, they are a reflection of the frequency of engagement between proactive Police Officers and Prolific Priority Offenders. They provide an indication of police activity, particularly regarding the number of highly visible patrols in the community.

There were **3,180** Stop and Searches in Q4 2010, an increase of +850 or +36% compared to **2,330** in Q3 2010. In year on year comparison, there were **9,419** in 2010 compared to **3,720** in 2009, an increase of +5,699 or +153% as shown below in Figures 41 and 42:
